It has been a busy first quarter preparing for our annual Capitol Hill Fly-In, 11 March 2020. We have confirmed senior members from the Department of Defense and Military Services to share their perspectives on the Munitions Response program, specifically funding challenges:

- Ms. Maureen Sullivan Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, Environment
- Ms. Lara Beasley, HQ USACE Environmental Chief
- Mr. John Henderson, Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Energy, Installations and Environment
- Mr. Lucian Niemeyer, Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Energy, Installations and Environment

And leading up to our Fly-In, we had a great day on Capitol Hill, 29 January 2020, making preliminary introductions to the challenges facing our industry. The Livingston Group was able to schedule and assist with the following meetings:

- Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC): Discussed disparity between MMRP funds in services' FY20 budget requests and MMRP funds budgeted.
- Senate Appropriations Committee, Defense (SAC(D)): Discussed disparity between MMRP funds in services' FY20 budget requests and MMRP funds budgeted.
- Representative Austin Scott (GA. 8th District): Discussed challenges with USAF executing \$14 million for MMRP in FY20 despite requesting and receiving \$73.9 million.
- House Appropriations Committee, Defense (HAC(D)): Discussed disparity between MMRP funds in services' FY20 budget requests and MMRP funds budgeted.
- Representative Jimmy Panetta (CA, 20th District): Discussed challenge with Fort Ord FY20 funding.
- House Armed Services Committee (HASC): Discussed disparity between MMRP funds in services' FY20
 budget requests and MMRP funds budgeted. Also mentioned that DoD is not fulfilling legal requirement to
 list MMRP sites by congressional district.
- Representative Steve Palazzo (MS, 4th District): Discussed disparity between MMRP funds in services' FY20 budget requests and MMRP funds budgeted.
- Senator Diane Feinstein (CA): Discussed challenge with Fort Ord FY20 funding and overall MMRP funding.

Based on these meetings, Brian Glackin and Joe Kalmin have submitted over 200 FY21 Appropriation and Authorization requests on behalf of NAOC.

And while we continue to face challenges to MMRP funding, be assured your NAOC Government Affairs team continues to work tirelessly on your behalf. I look forward to seeing many of you next week.

Small Business Chairman - Mr. David Nelson

The mission of the Small Business Committee is to provide a platform for NAOC to move forward the mission, objectives and interest of the Association in concert with the advancement and assistance of its small business members. The start of 2020 has been very active for small business from a regulatory standpoint for small businesses. Highlights include:

- In February 2020, the Small Business Administration (SBA) issued its answers to frequently asked questions (FAQs) concerning the new rule changes to the HUBZone Program. These FAQs follow the December 26, 2019 effective date of the new HUBZone rules and should be helpful for current and potential HUBZone firms. Click here for more information:

- In summer 2020, there will be changes to the certification process for WOSBs and EDWOSBs.
 - Once the changes go into effect, companies will no longer be able to self-certify as a WOSB or EDWOSB.
 - o Companies will have to either certify through an approved third-party entity or go through the SBA's FREE online certification at certify.sba.gov.

- On January 2, 2020, the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) issued a proposed rule to create a new 25 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) part 82 that would establish procedures for a non-federally recognized Alaska Native entity to be acknowledged as an Indian tribe by the federal government. This regulation is the first to establish a process for Alaska Native entities to be federally recognized as a tribe since the Alaska Amendment of the Indian Reorganization Act (IRA) was enacted in 1936. This proposed rule opens the door for the creation of more Alaska Native Corporations (ANCs) and tribal businesses, potentially adding opportunities for tribal businesses to increase assets through new business collaborations and acquisitions. - On February 27, 2020, the FAR Council published a final rule (Rule) that amends the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) to implement regulatory changes made by the Small Business Administration (SBA) in 2013. See 78 Fed. Reg. 61114 (Oct. 2, 2013). The Rule updates this regulation by making the following changes:
 - A contractor required to re-represent as a result of a Triggering Event has to re-represent its size <u>and socioeconomic status</u> (e.g., SDVOSB, HUBZone, WOSB/EDWOSB, 8(a)), as applicable. Currently, only size re-representation is expressly required.
 - When a contractor undergoes a merger or acquisition, both the acquiring and acquired concerns must re-represent their small business and/or socioeconomic status. This is significant because, although SBA regulations have imposed this requirement since 2013, the current version of the FAR does not expressly require an acquiring concern to re-represent its status as a result of an acquisition.

- o Contracting officers are expressly authorized to request size and socioeconomic status rerepresentation for task orders.

- Beginning in mid-2020, the Department of Defense (DoD) will begin assigning a CMMC level to every single procurement it issues. DoD has made compliance with the applicable CMMC level a mandatory element of contract eligibility. In other words, if an offeror doesn't meet the CMMC level assigned to a solicitation, it won't be eligible for that award. That's not all. Compliance with the applicable CMMC certification is required for any subcontractor under the opportunity, too. CMMC certifications must be obtained through a third-party auditor. As of mid-February 2020, DOD has not yet announced who those auditors will be, or what that process will look like. DOD has said, however, that it will start including CMMC level requirements in requests for information as early as June 2020. Helpfully, DOD has issued the draft model for review: https://www.acq.osd.mil/cmmc/draft.html . Going forward, every DOD contractor—prime or subcontractor, small business or large—must meet the required CMMC certification; and if it doesn't, it will not be eligible for the award.

The mission of the Operations and Standards Committee (OSC) is to advise government agencies on munitions response operations and standards issues in areas of safety, operations, personnel, and training. The committee provides an open forum to discuss current issues, reviews and distributes guidance documents, organizes technical webinars, and establishes teams as needed to address and find solutions to issues of concern to the NAOC membership.

At the start of 2020, there are already several ongoing OSC efforts. We are working with the NAOC President and the Government Affairs Committee (GAC) to provide feedback to USACE on their recent Performance Work Statement template for munitions response projects and do our best to ensure NAOC members' concerns are incorporated. We are also continuing our partnership with the GAC and Technology Committees to identify and elevate other issues with inconsistent applications of Government guidance and other impediments to project operations, including language in DDESB TP-18. There are several other action items underway and the OSC will report on these as they progress, as well as soliciting additional input from its members and/or the wider NAOC membership on these and other topics throughout the year. Please do not hesitate to contact me with suggestions for other items we can address.

The committee also partners with the Technology Committee to review guidance and present technical webinars. We try to schedule the NAOC webinars in coordination with the Military Munitions Support Services (M2S2) series provided by USACE so that, between NAOC and M2S2 webinars, our members can participate in free, informative technical webinars throughout the year. We already had the first of these webinars scheduled for 2020 – "DDESB TP-18: Minimum Qualifications for Personnel Conducting MEC-related Activities" – which was presented by Jeff Brewer of the USACE EM CX on February 19 at 2pm EST/1pm CST. This webinar reviewed some of the requirements in TP-18 considering observations and lessons learned from USACE QA project site visits. Many thanks to NAOC and OSC member company EA for supporting these webinars. NAOC wants to reach as many participants within our member companies as possible, so we strongly encourage you to share the webinar registration information with your munition's response personnel. The OSC is following up with the Navy and ATF on additional webinars for 2020, so stay tuned.

The OSC's success in prior years has been a direct result of our members' active involvement. We welcome new members, ideas and topics for discussion. The OSC holds meetings on the first Wednesday of the month throughout the year, so please contact me if you would like to be added to the OSC roster and participate.
